Historic news! The one hundred and sixteen-year-old 188 S. Main Street building, formerly a bank, was recently added to the National Register of Historic Places. To be considered for listing in the National Register, a property must generally be at least 50 years old, and must also be significant when evaluated in relationship to major historical events or trends in the history of their community, the state, or the nation. A property must also possess historic integrity – the ability to convey its significance.

The month of May also marks Historic Preservation Month! To celebrate historic preservation and our national register designation, the Town of Elizabeth and the Historic Advisory Board are hosting a plaque presentation event on Saturday, May 6th, at 10 am in front of 188 S. Main Street.

In addition to this event, the Town will be bringing back the popular Elizabeth Historic Walk & Talk on Main Street the morning of September 30th.

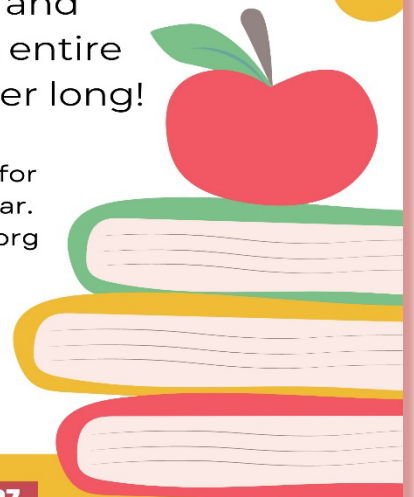

Town Clean-Up Day is scheduled for **May 20th, 2023, 303 Washington Street**

8:00 am – 12:00 pm

Bring your water bills to provide proof of residency.
(You must be a Town of Elizabeth resident to participate)

Items to be allowed are as follows:

- Household trash/Debris – 2 pickup loads or equivalent
- Paints of All Types in sealed containers with labels
- Waste Motor Oil in sealed containers
- 4 Boxes (copy paper size) of material to be shredded
- Electronics/TV/Stereo/Computers/Printers/
Computer Monitors/Batteries
- No Mattresses or Box Springs
- Trees/Brush/Limbs are accepted year around
- No biohazard materials excepted

54th Annual Professional Municipal Clerks Week

Mayor Nick Snively read a proclamation proclaiming April 30 through May 6, 2023, as Professional Municipal Clerks Week.

Professor William Bennett Munro, author of one of the first textbooks written on the topic of municipal administration, wrote: "No other office in municipal service has so many contacts. It serves the Mayor, the City Council, the City Manager, and all administrative departments, without exception. All of them call upon it, almost daily, for some service or information."

TYPICAL RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE MUNICIPAL AND DEPUTY

CLERK: • Maintain the official council minutes, ordinance books and all records and documents • Index all official actions of council • Issue licenses and permits • Process contracts and agreements • Keepers of community history and vital records • Receive, distribute, and file correspondence from citizens and other governmental agencies • Administer elections, registration, and voting • Act as a key liaison between local government and its citizens • Handle significant financial responsibilities including preparation of tax rolls, special assessments, and budgets • Provide central services such as personnel, purchasing, etc. • Sometimes the Clerk's office is fondly called the "junk drawer". If you don't know where it goes, give it to the Clerk.

It is unlawful for any person to operate any motorized vehicle on any park lands in the Town of Elizabeth (Town Code 11-6-30). Park lands are held and maintained for everyone's enjoyment, and damage to vegetation can take years to recover. This law is strictly enforced.
